Hello Land for Wildlifers,



Land for Wildlife (LfW)

has done great things in the past year with growth of 22%. The number of members as at 31st December 2016 was 1513 landholders. The **Total Area registered** was = 122,601 Hectares with an average property being 81.03 Ha.

Compared: 42,000 Ha. in 2009 with an average of 81.55 Ha. The **Remnant Habitat Area** = 56,924 Hectares = 46 % of total area now compared to 48 % in 2009. While the **Restored Area** = 16,205 Hectares = 13% of total now compared to 3% iof total n 2009. This is the Big Winner with 16,205 Ha. now being rehabilitated. If this work by landholders was costed @ \$1,000 per Ha.

= \$16,205,000 at negligible cost to government.

New England:

Armidale Tree Group are likely to become a Regional Provider. Covering the area of Armidale, Walcha and Uralla.

North Coast:

Kyogle: A new Landcare Network; Border Ranges Richmond Valley has been formed and it replaces Northern Landcare Support Services as the local Regional Provider.

Mullumbimby: Brunswick Valley Landcare Network led by Peter are the Regional Providers working in the Byron Shire region with council support.

Murwillumbah: Michael Corke at Tweed Council has built up 150 members in 4 years.



Alstonville: Hannah from Richmond River Landcare works is steadily building numbers in magnificent Avocado Country .

Coffs Harbour and Bellingen; Envite are the newest Regional Providers.



Karuah Great Lakes Landcare and Great Lakes Council have been working together since 2012. While the councils are being amalgamated arrangements are in place to support members.

Training of Regional Providers:

There are now over 120 people trained a s Land for Wildlife Assessors in NSW. However, only about 20 have actually applied this training. To improve the skills and experience of Assessors, from this month trainees will need to have actually conducted an assessment before being sent a Certificate. It is hoped this will lead to more confident assessors and more registrations. CEN will liaise with

trainees if there are any issues.

Lesley has recently been training students at Canberra Institute of Technology in LFW. (She recently rescued a lamb).



Ten Year Agreement

CEN have recently been awarded a ten year agreement to coordinate Land for Wildlife in NSW and the ACT. It runs from 2017 to 2027.



<u>Great Eastern Ranges</u> is being established as a Non Government Organisation with a new Board.

The GER Transition Group has been tasked with managing funds until the new GER Organisation is established. In the meantime it is expected that the GER Vision will remain the same with regional partnerships continuing.

Biodiversity Legislation: Is out for public consultation during June. It continues the existing Conservation Agreement and Wildlife Refuge strategy and adds a new element for Stewardship Agreements.

Voluntary Private Land Conservation is building!

Land for Wildlife in the ACT:

CEN Land for Wildlife now includes the ACT. It is a great advantage to have the Regional Provider partnership for the ACT as it is a common water catchment. In addition, the existing Regional Providers are able to work in a seamless manner between the ACT and NSW. There are about 140 eligible properties for LFW in the ACT.

ACT Pilot Project:

A Pilot Project in 2016 to 2017 is aiming to register 20 properties in the ACT.

The ACT Government also provided sponsorship for the Land for Wildlife Biennial Forum in Queanbeyan.





Other members of our ecosystem communities



Land for Wildlife is a voluntary property registration scheme for rural landholders with half a hectare of native bushland or more and that aims to assist landholders to maintain wildlife habitats on their land. Registration is free and non-binding. The good faith agreement between the CEN and landholders does not change the legal status of the properties, and information is confidential.

Habitat for Wildlife Online is a program available for

urban or rural landholders and renters who are interested in wildlife conservation but who may not have a large bushland remnant on their property.

Smaller holdings can provide safe havens for wildlife moving between larger bushland areas. For a small fee, registrants will receive a membership certificate, a small HFW sign, a resource kit and a newsletter for two years.
